DEATH OF SPECIAL AGENT RAYMOND P. SULLIVAN

It is with the greatest regret that the death of Raymond P. Sullivan at the National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Maryland, on 2 April 1957, is announced. Ray was the former Supervising Agent at DIO-3ND and more recently the Head, Review and Control Section (Op-921D2) at ONI. He was widely known and greatly esteemed throughout the organization. Ray was buried at the Arlington National Cemetery.

FIDELIFAX

FIDELIFAX is an organization which began operating nationally on 1 May 1956, and is composed largely of ex-FBI agents. The personnel division of this group handles applicant investigations for business and industry. In order to accomplish this work correspondents in various locations who can handle leads in their respective areas are being solicited, among them being Naval Intelligence representatives. It is emphasized that our agents are not permitted to engage in any employment outside their regular duties for the Navy, without the express permission of the Director of Naval Intelligence.

A Seminar for all Supervising agents is scheduled for the week of 3 June 1957. This will wind up the Training Program for the current fiscal year. Classes for the next fiscal year will commence in late September.

MARINE CORPS ORDER 3850.1A ON "COUNTERINTELLIGENCE"

DIO's and IO-PRNC are requested to review Marine Corps Order 3850.1A of 12 March 1957 the subject of which is "Counterintelligence." Paragraph 5.a (3) is quoted: "Commanders of activities physically located within Naval Districts or River Naval Commands will require Marine Corps counterintelligence personnel to report in person to the appropriate District Intelligence Officer or Intelligence Officer, River Naval Command upon their assignment to counterintelligence duties for instructions concerning the extent of their participation in investigations for which the Office of Naval Intelligence is responsible in accordance with the Delimitation Agreement and for technical control and guidance in other counterintelligence matters. This close personal relationship should be maintained on a continuing basis." DIO's and IO-PRNC are requested to use their discretion in the use of U.S. Marine Corps counterintelligence personnel in conducting investigations. This matter will be explored further during the Supervising Agents Seminar.

REPORT WRITING NOTES

It is not clear in some cases, particularly in category 7, whether the controlling District intends to submit a closing report. There are cases in which all investigative leads are in other Districts. The originating districts should submit a closing report so that ONI files may be complete, or ONI should be advised by 152 that the case is completed.

Always insure that the "Subject" data on 119's and 152's is complete. The address should always be given, including the military address where appropriate.

Always include the date of birth of Subject on a Notice of Case Pending as an aid to identification. This is pertinent where no Personal History Statement is attached.

TECHNICAL SURVEILLANCE DEFINED

The use of the term "Technical surveillance" in investigation reports shall refer only to instances in which electronic investigative apparatus is utilized. Other kinds of surveillances employed shall be characterized in plain language or by assigning an informant's symbol, depending on the circumstances.
