



ROY D. NEDROW Director Naval Criminal Investigative Service

Roy D. Nedrow was appointed Director of the Naval Criminal Investigative Service on December 28, 1992. Prior to his appointment, he served as Deputy Assistant Director of the Office of Investigations of the United States Secret Service.

Mr. Nedrow was born on October 19, 1942, in Boston, Massachusetts. He attended the University of California at Berkeley where he earned a bachelor's degree in criminology in 1964.

He began his law enforcement career with the Berkeley, California, Police Department, where he served for six years, first as a uniformed patrolman and later as a training sergeant and detective. In 1970, Mr. Nedrow was appointed as a special agent of the United States Secret Service assigned to the San Francisco Field Office. Subsequent career assignments included duty at the New York Field Office; the Protective Services Division, Washington, DC; and the San Francisco Field Office.

After his promotion to Assistant to the Special Agent in Charge of the Washington Field Office, he supervised forgery investigations and protection operations. He held management positions including Special Agent in Charge of the Secret Service's headquarters Counterfeit Division, Special Agent in Charge of the San Diego Field Office, and Deputy Assistant Director of the Office of Inspections.

Concurrent with his promotion to the Senior Executive Service, he was assigned as the principal Deputy Assistant Director of the Office of Investigations, responsible for 1,200 special agents conducting criminal investigations and protective support activities at approximately 100 field locations worldwide and managing a budget of approximately \$300 million.

Mr. Nedrow has received numerous awards and commendations for his superior performance and management accomplishments, including Department of the Treasury Certificates of Award for Sustained Superior Performance and a Department of the Navy promotion to SES-6 in March, 1995. In 1973, he received the Secretary of the Treasury Award for exceptional investigative skills in connection with a long-term undercover "sting" operations conducted with the New York City Police Department's Major Crimes Unit.
