
My dear Secretary:

It is regretted that illness confined me to the hospital during the recent visit to Eleventh Naval District of your assistant, Mr. Jerome Doyle. However, Captain G. M. Ravenscroft, U.S. Navy, Chief of Staff, conferred at length with Mr. Doyle and made possible for him discussions with various activity commanders and the District Intelligence Officer and members of the District Intelligence Officer's staff.

Although there seems to be some discrepancy in statements reported made to the various District officers by Mr. Doyle and his two companions, Messrs. Hogan and McGrath, concerning the details of the proposed program, it is evident that an interesting and most necessary project is under consideration to provide urgently-required adequate safeguards against espionage and sabotage.

Although no written program was presented by Mr. Doyle, statements, as made by Mr. Doyle to the Chief of Staff and reported by the latter to me, in substance, proposed the following plan:

- l. That a civilian highly-trained investigative unit be created to function within the naval service;
- 2. That the investigative unit would be composed of from 300 to 400 specialists selected for their abilities to function as mechanics, clerks, draftsmen, etc.;
- 3. That the investigators would be assigned in groups of about 25 to the various naval districts;

- 4. That the investigative groups would function under direction of the commandants in the various districts to augment the Naval Intelligence field units of the districts;
- 5. That investigative group personnel, while on field duty, would be under direction of the Intelligence Branch field unit heads;
- 6. That the investigative groups personnel would be assigned with a flexibility that would permit easy movement from district to district of specialists in trades, etc., and
- 7. That, in general, the investigative groups would function under Washington headquarters for personnel administrative purposes only.

From Mr. Doyle's reported statements to the Chief of Staff, it is evident that a greatly-needed protective personnel force is under consideration and, if the program is planned as outlined by Mr. Doyle to the Chief of Staff, the Commandant would be thoroughly in accord with its development.

Your thorough understanding of our Eleventh Naval District plant protection problems and your eagerness to assist us in solving them is most heartening.
